# Healthy Fundraiser Toolkit



#### **Intro**

Fundraising is a common avenue to generate money for schools. Fundraising is important because it can help with school budgets and pay for equipment, materials, and supplies. Healthy fundraisers are a great way to provide optimism on healthy eating and nutrition education. According to the Center for Science in the Public Interest, 80% of schools typically raise their funds via food, of which 76% are foods and drinks that are nutritionally deprived. Bringing a different twist to fundraising and encouraging students and parents to spend their money on sustainable and healthier items are a great way to start the year!



It may be commonly misunderstood that certain fundraising techniques are more reliable or valid than healthier ones. The Center for Science in the Public Interest provides a few examples of myths and the reality of them.

*Myth:* Selling junk food is the only lucrative way to raise funds for schools. **Reality:** More healthy fundraisers are available to schools than unhealthy fundraisers.

Many non-food and healthy-food fundraisers generate profits for schools equal to or greater than profits from fundraisers selling low-nutrition foods.

**Myth:** The only foods and beverages children will purchase are junk foods and soft drinks.

Reality: "Students will buy and consume healthful foods and beverages – and schools can make money from selling healthful options," said USDA and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Of 17 schools and school districts that tracked income after switching to healthier school foods, 12 increased revenue and four reported no change. The one school district that did lose revenue in the short term experienced a subsequent revenue increase after the study was completed.

Myth: Bake sales are popular.

**Reality:** Maybe with kids, but many parents resent bake sales, which require them to purchase ingredients, bake an item to sell, and then give their child money to buy the products for which they have already paid.

# **Healthy Fundraising Ideas**

- Walk a thons
- Book fairs
- Non-food products (jewelry, candles, magazines, toys, picture frames, etc)
- Recycling
- Healthy foods (spices, nuts, coffee, etc)
- Auctions
- School-related promotional items (pencils, erasers, sweatshirts, t-shirts, etc)
- Car washes

#### Come up with catchy titles

- Turning Trash (Bags) into Treasure vs. Trash Bag Fundraiser
- PJ Parade vs. PJ Fundraiser

### Let them know WHY you want to fundraise

- Field trips
- Classroom technology
- Playground equipment

#### Publicize beforehand

- E-mail
- Flyers
- Morning announcements
- Newsletters (school and/or PTA)





Telephone messages

#### Give incentives to encourage and motivate

- Ask local businesses or grocery stores to donate
- Can give extra recess, prizes (ex: toys)

# **Success Stories Examples**



<u>Turning Trash (Bags) into Treasure</u> \$2,000-\$3,000 raised Millcreek Elementary started off by selling different size trash bags.

- Initially completed by one person
- Called local trash bag company and set up for weekend pick up
- In coordination with earth day
- Preorder forms: submit at least 10 days before pick up date and gave enough time, including a weekend, for students to reach out to everyone
  - Sent emails, made phone calls, provided a website, place ads
- Custodian needed to help move boxes and put in storage
- · People needed
  - Volunteers to pass out the trash bags (2 people)
- Yearly successful event and adapted to other schools and organizations
- Tip: used an incentive to give reward for those that raised the most

#### Fruit Sale Success \$10,000 (initially \$8,000)

- Parent Volunteer Group Coordinated a Summer Committee
- Called local produce and set up for 2 Saturdays for pick up
- Preorder forms
  - Sent emails, made phone calls, provided a website, place ads
- People needed
  - o Pre-event (25)
  - Volunteers to sort/pass fruits (12 people)
  - Volunteers to check off orders and help carry to the car (5 people)
- Yearly successful event (10<sup>th</sup> year) and making \$20,000 total and \$10,000 net profit
- Tips: don't only target parents of the students, but local restaurants and neighbors!



#### **More Successful Stories**

#### PJ Parade:

- Pay \$1 to wear PJs to school
- \$8,500 raised

#### No-Bake Bake sale:

- Donate money that would have been spent in a bake sale
- \$26,000 raised (initially \$8,000)

- Made pledges to walk, run, or roll for 30 minutes
- \$37.000 raised

#### 5/10/15 Reading Challenge:

- Students find 5 people to pledge \$10 for the students to read 15 minutes a day for a week
- \$7,600 raised

#### Teacher Jog-A-Thon:

#### Boosterthon Fun Run & Roll:

Students invest in their teacher and sponsor them in jog a thon

• \$16,000 raised
